And this young man would go over there and live there—his parents would pull him outside and he'd stay there until it was time to come in and...oh, bless his heart. But he was good, and I think...we probably gave him a little knowledge, too, because we used to tell all the good stuff...what we were doing and where we were going. And we were going over to the ice cream store and would he like a little ice cream? But it'd be all finished by the time we got to his house. And...we just loved it. I mean, the experience was so great at Rosary and I wouldn't have given it up for anything. And my sisters were here too. I had two sisters that—partially, anyway—the second one was a nun. And then the first one was...she only went here for two years and—but she loved it too—but then she got married. So that was the end of her. Okay, thank you. Alright.
